
This activity provides opportunities to

- develop a knowledge of the letters of the alphabet including the sounds they make.
- develop an awareness that words are made up of sounds.
- develop control of small muscles.

Scavenger Letter Match

1. Print several upper case (capital) letters on a long strip of paper. Use large printing and spread them out.
2. On post-it notes or scrap paper, print the corresponding lower case letters and place them around the house.
3. Like a scavenger hunt, your child finds the post-it note, and matches it to the upper case letter on the large paper strip.
4. The game is finished when the child has found and matched all of the upper and lower case letters.
5. As your child is ready, add more letters to match and find.
6. To extend the learning: your child could make this game for a younger sibling or a friend.
7. Change up the game by having your child find objects around the house that begin with the sound of the letters you have printed on the strip of paper.
